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LOSS OF FRED GERBER OF ONEIDA COMMUNITY

High Type of Citizen, Good Friend and Neighbor

Fred Gerber of Oneida died Saturday morning at the Seneca hospital, after illness of about six months. Mr. Gerber would have been 66 years of age this August 11.

The funeral service is being held this Monday afternoon at 2:00 at the Oneida Methodist church, conducted by Rev. Steve Parker, Seneca, the pastor. Burial will be at the Oneida cemetery.

Mr. Gerber was a very high type of citizen, a man of trust and responsibility. He had lived in the Oneida community some 48 years, retiring from the farm to Oneida eight years ago.

He was born in Berne, Switzerland, on August 11, 1885, a son of Christian and Anna Gerber. He came to the United States, and to this county in 1902. On March 9, 1910, he was married at Seneca to Emma Heinen. He is survived by his wife, and by a son, George A. Gerber of Manhattan. Two children preceded him in death, John A. and Betty Jean. There are two grandchildren, Suzanne and Bruce Gerber.

Mr. Gerber is also survived by his brother, Ernest, of Oneida, and by three sisters who live in Switzerland.

He was a member of the I.O.O.F. lodge of Oneida.

The Thornburg Funeral Home is in charge of the arrangements. It was expected the pallbearers would be Walter Heiniger, Henry Meyer, Curtis Gilmore, Claude Anderson, Orville Bell and Ed. McCarty.

Freight cost usually runs around 75c per head.

Gophers
While driving about the County I have noticed that many fields indicate a great deal of gopher activity. Farmers should either trap or poison these varmints. Remember that we have poison wheat available here at the office for those of you who wish to use it to poison gophers.
